

# Who Thought of Giving Exams?

The first country to implement a nationwide standardized test was ancient China. Called the imperial examination, it was established by the Sui Dynasty in 605 CE and was meant to select the best candidates for specific governmental jobs.

In England, attendance at school was not required until the late 19th century. The first public examinations for schools were introduced in 1858 in response to a demand from schools themselves as a way of marking their pupils' achievement. Schools approached universities - such as Cambridge and Oxford – and asked them to produce exams that boys could take where they lived. Girls were not officially permitted to enter public examinations until 1867.
